How do I get there?	Small parking lot or metered street parking.
What should I bring?	Notepads and pencils will be <i>provided</i> . Personal laptops and tablets are permitted for note-taking, but cases must be stored with other personal belongings.
How much does it cost?	Library appointments are free, archive appointments are \$5/hour.

Do they offer staff assistance?	 <u>Quick research questions</u>: Staff will answer specific questions about the history of Newport county and resources in our collection without charging a fee. These are questions that can typically be answered with 30 minutes or less of staff research. Beyond that time, requests will be charged <u>Remote research services</u>: For researchers who cannot visit the NHS in person, NHS staff can conduct research on their behalf. The first half hour of staff research is free, after which fees apply

How do I schedule an appointment?	Walk-ins welcome.
How do I get there?	 To enter the library when you visit, please ring the buzzer to the left of the front entrance doors. Once inside, proceed to the sign-in desk, which is just inside the double glass doors across the entrance lobby An accessible entrance is available via a paved pathway to the right of the front

	entrance stairs, through a gate in the picket fence surrounding the library. Please ring the bell to the left of the rear door for entrance to the Reading Room
What should I bring?	Laptops, pencils (no pens allowed), notebooks, cameras (no flash) no food, limited drink.
Do I need a parent/guardian/adult with me?	No.
How much does it cost?	No fees.
Do they offer staff assistance?	Finding aids are available for research assistance. They will provide you with a general description of a specific collection, the volume of records within that collection, as well as a detailed box and folder inventory (<u>Archives</u> <u>request form</u>).

How do I get there?	Special Collections is located on the 3rd floor of the Library.
What should I bring?	When you arrive we'll ask you to leave your coat, bag and other belongings in one of the lockers outside the reading room (view locker instructions here). You may bring pencils (no pens), paper, laptops and cameras into the reading room. You do need clean hands, so we'll ask you to visit the restroom around the corner to wash them (we encourage using hand sanitizer, but not directly before handling collection materials). How do I schedule an appointment?	Email or call to set up a reference interview and to make an appointment for your 2-hour visit.
How do I get there?	 Parking: 2-hour street parking Bus: RIPTA routes 1, 40, and 92 have stops within a 5-10 minute walk

What should I bring?	Notebooks, pencils, laptops, phones, tablets, and chargers allowed. They ask visitors leave pens, bags, food/drink, & coats outside/in the lobby.
Do I need a parent/guardian/adult with me?	Students who do not have a state ID/License (i.e. 18 and under) should be accompanied by an adult.
How much does it cost?	No entrance fee. Copy charge of \$0.25 per scan.
Do they offer staff assistance?	You are able to schedule a reference interview for free (Via phone, e-mail, or video chat) and up to 1 hour of research and scanning. RIHS staff are happy to make scans of their materials to send.
What are the Covid protocols?	Masks required.

How do I schedule an appointment?	Email the reference team and include what your topic of research is and what you are looking for, if possible.
How do I get there?	 Parking: In the parking lot, only park in spots labeled "Reserved for Secretary of

	 State". To enter the lot visitors should turn down Greene Street and then turn right into the parking lot on the right. Designated spots are on the far end, facing back towards Broad Street. There is also metered street parking Bus: There is an R line stop for RIPTA across the street from the building, and also Kennedy Plaza is about a 10 minute walk away
What should I bring?	Notebook, pencil, cell phone or camera to take pictures (No flash allowed).
Do I need a parent/guardian/adult with me?	Yes, especially if you are under the age of 14.
How much does it cost?	No entrance fee. Photocopy charges of \$0.15 per page for B&W, or \$0.50 for color.
Do they offer staff assistance?	Staff are willing to help gather resources and find materials around your chosen topic.
What are the Covid protocols?	Masks required.

How do I get there?	Parking lot available, old Washington County Jail
What should I bring?	Notebook, pencils provided, phone for photos
Do I need a parent/guardian/adult with me?	Yes for middle school students, no for high school students.
How much does it cost?	.25 per page for copies and scans

Do they offer staff assistance?	Help navigate other collections, digitized information can be provided upon request.

How do I schedule an appointment?	Students are encouraged to schedule a tour visit in order to gain perspective and context of the museum so that they are better able to form research questions. Students would be encouraged to set up research visits later, or depending on their interests Mr. Belz could help focus on suitable archival materials.
How do I get there?	Parking is free and is adjacent to the building and in an overflow lot next door.
What should I bring?	Pencils, notebook, camera (no flash).
Do I need a parent/guardian/adult with me?	Students 13 and under must be accompanied by a parent/guardian/adult.
How much does it cost?	 \$5 for the 1 hour tour Photocopies (Black and White): \$1.50 per page, Photocopies (Full Color): \$3.50 per page, Digital Scanning: \$25 per image
Do they offer staff assistance?	Yes.
What are the Covid protocols?	Masks and social distance required.
What will I find there?	The Archival Collection and library is limited in scope and focuses almost exclusively on the very late 19th century, 20th and early 21st century material. The Tomaquag Museum Archival Collection is dedicated to acquiring and preserving cultural materials of historical significance specifically related to Indigenous culture, history, storytelling, ecology, politics and

	sovereignty. The archive focuses on the Indigenous people of the Northeast United States and Southern New England, primarily the Narragansett/Niantic people, but the museum also collects relevant materials related to Indigenous people throughout the Western Hemisphere.
